Submissions to the Draft Nelson 2060 Strategy

1. Purpose of Report

- 1.1 To consider, deliberate and make decisions on submissions to the draft Nelson 2060 Strategy.

2. Recommendations

THAT the Framing our Future Committee includes feedback from the Mayor's Taskforce on Sustainability, in relation to the submissions received on the draft Nelson 2060 Strategy (in document 1494342), in its consideration and deliberations;

AND THAT the draft Nelson 2060 Strategy be amended to reflect the Framing our Future Committee's decisions on submissions made at this meeting, and be reported back to the Council for adoption;

AND THAT the Framing our Future Committee acknowledges and thanks the Mayor's Taskforce on Sustainability for their work in overseeing the development of the Nelson 2060 Strategy.

3. Background

- 3.1 At its meeting of 19 February 2013 Council approved the draft Nelson 2060 Strategy for public consultation following minor amendments.
- 3.2 The consultation period ran from 25 February 2013 to 28 March 2013. Council received 91 submissions with 32 submitters requesting the opportunity to provide feedback at the hearing on 9 April 2013.

4. Discussion

Summary of Submissions

- 4.1 A summary of the submissions that requested changes to the document is included in Attachment 1 with staff comment and advice. A summary of all submissions is included in Attachment 2.

- 4.2 Of the 91 submissions received 51 were supportive of the strategy, 3 did not support the strategy and 37 did not indicate whether they were in support or not.

Recommendations from the Mayor's Taskforce

- 4.3 The Mayor's Taskforce on Sustainability met on 18 April 2013 to consider the submissions received and to provide advice to the Council in order to ensure that community views are reflected in the final Strategy.
- 4.4 The recommendations of the Mayor's Taskforce on Sustainability are included in Attachment 1.

Key Issues Arising from Submissions

- 4.5 Measurable Targets and Goals
- 4.5.1 A number of submissions (submission numbers 8, 25, 32, 39, 46, 64, 68, 71, 72, 73, L3, L7) noted that the draft Nelson 2060 Strategy does not contain measurable targets or actions in relation to the goals. This raised concerns in relation to the Council and the community remaining committed to the Nelson 2060 Strategy if there was nothing specific to be accountable for and how the community would be able to measure progress in the absence of targets.
- 4.5.2 The goals in the draft Nelson 2060 Strategy were identified by the community as the areas, where as a community, we need to focus our efforts first in order to move towards the vision. They are purposefully broad, as specific actions will need the commitment of a wide group of people including Council, businesses, community organisations and individuals and therefore need to be agreed to by those that are affected.
- 4.5.3 Working together and gaining that commitment is the next step in the ongoing Nelson 2060 Strategy process, in order to determine specific actions and measures for the goals. During the development of the Nelson 2060 vision and goals the community came up with hundreds of ideas and actions and more have been provided through this public consultation. These will form the basis for this ongoing work.
- 4.5.4 The Council and the community cannot do everything at once. The goals in Nelson 2060 provide a shared view on where action is needed as a priority. Several collaborative processes are planned or already underway in the areas of fresh/coastal waters and energy. The Council is proposing to focus on collaborative approaches within these areas; Goal 3 - "All our Coastal and Freshwater Habitats are Healthy" and Goal 6 - "We move from using fossil fuels to renewable energy sources" to develop targets and actions and pilot the Nelson 2060 Strategy approach.
- 4.5.5 The Nelson 2060 Strategy is a living process and will be updated to reflect community progress towards targets and highlight actions being taken to achieve the goals.

4.6 Action Nelson City Council Should Take

4.6.1 A number of submissions (submission numbers 39, 72, 74, L2, L4) stated the importance of Council carrying through the vision and goals in the Nelson 2060 Strategy into the way Council operates. This is a key focus of the first year of Council's implementation for the Nelson 2060 Strategy. In addition, the story of how the Council is already moving Nelson towards its vision for 2060 through current work programmes and activities will be developed to promote awareness and to engage the community.

4.6.2 Additionally, as has been raised throughout the Framing our Future process, submitters commented that in order for the Nelson 2060 Strategy to be successful a regional approach is needed and will require the support and involvement of neighbouring districts. Submitters consider that Council has a key role to play in developing these relationships.

4.7 Indigenous Biodiversity and Landscapes

4.7.1 Several submitters (submission numbers 71, 75 and L8) noted that native biodiversity, ecosystems and landscapes were missing from the goals in the document.

4.7.2 In particular, the submission of the Nelson Biodiversity Forum (submission number L8) identified that within the current structure of Nelson 2060 there is no clear place to talk about the value of indigenous biodiversity or landscape forms. The submitter comments that this is fundamental to achieving the Nelson 2060 vision and should therefore be included in the document. Suggestions were provided by the submitter to rectify this.

4.7.3 Relevant to these considerations is that the goals were identified by the community as the areas where action needed to be focused as a priority over action in other areas. They are not intended to be a complete list of everything that needs to be done to achieve the vision.

4.7.4 The importance of fully functioning natural systems as fundamental to achieving the vision is an underlying principle to all the goals (Principle 3 on page 39).

4.7.5 Staff comment and advice in relation to this submission is provided in the attached summary of submissions (Attachment 1).

4.8 Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement

4.8.1 23 submissions were received solely in relation to the Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement (TPPA) with an additional 26 submissions making comment on the TPPA. These submitters are requesting that Council adopt a similar resolution to Auckland Council in relation to the Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement.

- 4.8.2 Goal 2 – “We are all able to be involved in decisions” could be amended to include additional information on Council’s advocacy role on behalf of the Nelson community in relation to national and international activities. This would be a general statement rather than talking about specific central government activity that is currently topical.
- 4.8.3 It was agreed at the hearing of submissions on 9 April 2013 that the submissions regarding the TPPA would be forwarded to the 23 April 2013 Council – Governance and Policy and Planning meeting for discussion.

5. Conclusion

- 5.1 Decisions on submissions received will enable an amended Nelson 2060 Strategy to be considered for adoption by the Council at its Policy and Planning meeting on 6 June 2013.

Supporting Information

1. Fit with Purpose of Local Government

The Nelson 2060 Strategy provides a planning and decision making framework that will assist Council to make decisions on how best to deliver infrastructure and public services that meet the current and future needs of the Nelson community. It will do this by asking specific questions that directly ensure Council is meeting the purpose of Local Government in relation to good quality and cost effectiveness.

2. Fit with Community Outcomes and Council Priorities

The draft Nelson 2060 Implementation Plan 2013/14 is consistent with all of Nelson's community outcomes. Council priorities in the Long Term Plan 2012-2022 were aligned with the Nelson 2060 vision.

3. Fit with Strategic Documents

The Nelson 2060 Strategy will be one of Council's guiding strategic documents. It provides an overarching framework for Council decision making. It is expected that as Council's other strategic documents are reviewed, that they will align their direction and activities to also ensure that they are working towards the Nelson 2060 vision.

4. Sustainability

The draft Nelson 2060 Implementation Plan 2013/14 sets out how the Council will contribute to moving Nelson towards the goals and vision in Nelson 2060.

The Nelson 2060 Strategy is aimed at creating a sustainable future for Nelson, looking 50 years out.

5. Consistency with other Council policies

Over time, Council's policies and asset/activity management plans will need to be reviewed and aligned with the vision and direction set in the Nelson 2060 Strategy.

6. Long Term Plan/Annual Plan reference and financial impact

The Council adopted the Nelson 2060 vision in the Long Term Plan 2012-2022 and Council has advised that a Nelson 2060 Strategy will be produced in 2012/13. The priorities in the Long Term Plan 2012-2022 were also aligned with the vision.

Funding of \$45,000 has been sought through the Annual Plan 2013/14 to support the Council's implementation of the Nelson 2060 Strategy.

7. Decision-making significance

This is not a significant decision in terms of the Council's Significance Policy.

8. Consultation

The contents of the draft Nelson 2060 Strategy is the culmination of an extensive community engagement process over two years.

9. Inclusion of Māori in the decision making process

There is iwi representation on the Mayoral Taskforce. Kotahitanga nominated Kerensa Johnston to provide expert review from a Te Ao Māori perspective.
